### Along the Track

We continue to have great work days at RLS. February was one of the best!

Our track crew moved out of the compound at 8:15 with all the tools and work trucks to repair the 80' of mainline track that was damaged by vehicle traffic the weekend of February 13-

14, 2016.

Once on site, the track was disassemble in to panel lengths, removed from the roadbed, the ballast shoveled out of the trench, the good panels were installed while the Roadmaster returned to the Compound to select two new panels from the inventory in the yard.

When the Roadmaster left for the mainline, there was only one member working inside the Caboose packing up all the treasurers of 50 years of storage! But when the Roadmaster returned he found 12 members loading out SMP Dave Bunts pick up truck like Jed from the Beverly Hill-billies!! Stuff was stacked higher the cab of Dave's truck. By the end of the day the Caboose was completely empty and the RLS Treasures were stacked in the old storage container.

Back to the track with the panels and the mainline was restored to service by 12 Noon. This was the first track damage in 6 years since the park was remodeled so we have been very lucky.

Also going on in the Compound was the installation of the new propane storage cage. If you are a propane engine owner, please move your tanks to the storage unit. Your equipment storage key will work on the lock.

John Gurwell had his big truck and welded on the transfer table and rails, installed a new bumping post at the south end of the transfer table. Project manager Dave Bunts and Larry Jongerius were seen making additional survey readings on the new escape track.

Lunch was provided by Chef John Gurwell and his wife Mary with apple cobbler provided by Dessert Chef Bob Beard. The Board Meeting followed at 1:00PM

We are still looking for a trailer to get full size RR ties as part of the escape track project will require a short RR tie wall. We are in need of a flatbed trailer to bring 8 foot railroad ties to the compound. If you can help please contact Rich Casford.

We have the work day lunches covered through April!! As mentioned before the club pays for the food cost but it needs to be handled by one of our members. Several members volunteered to help as camp cooks. Is it your turn? Just give me a call or shoot me an email. Work day camp cook is open for May thru the end of the year.

The escape track is coming along nicely. Under the direction of Dave Bunts, all the piers were set straight and concrete poured. Several strong backed members backfilled all the holes so we have a compound that is less reminiscent of a battlefield, but you still have to be careful not to walk into one of the piers. There is no way you are going to knock one over, but the reverse may not be true at all.

Despite it being the dead of winter, run and work days have been very warm if not downright hot. That means we have to begin paying attention to staying hydrated and not overheating

again. It is important that none of us overexert ourselves. Heat stroke is real and it can sneak up on you. Please watch yourself and those around you. ## Attention All Membership

#### IF YOU OPEN IT MAKE SURE YOU CLOSE IT!!

If you open a switch on the mainline and proceed into a siding or fuel track, make sure you go back and reset the switch to the mainline. We are having a growing problem of members operating their locomotives and failing to reset the switch after they go through it. You might just find a train come into the siding right behind you!

Also RLS does not have sprung switches, make sure the switch handle is placed in the direction on the track you want to go. The springs in the switches are to keep the points closed when you approach a leading switch. You can derail your pilot truck or other cars in your train.

**ATTENTION ALL KEYHOLDERS:** If you come out to the railroad on any off day and open the compressor room or need the fuel & water system, make sure everything is closed before you go home. We have found the fuel pump left on and the air compressor cycling when no one is on the property. In the compressor room, all the compressors have on/off switches on the wall behind each unit. There is an on/off switch for fuel and water on wall just to the right of the electrical cabinet.

As a Keyholder if you are on property on off days it is your responsibility to make sure the facility is completely secure. If your name is on the sign in book, you are the one to take care of it. On Run Days the OS has the responsibility for security unless the alarm book is signed over to another Keyholder.
